PARENTING BY EXAMPLE

No matter how we teach and guide our children from birth until they are on their own, what will stick in their minds is what they see their parents and elders do. This makes us realize what a great responsibility it is to be models to our children.

I remember when my children were still toddlers and I was accosted by a policeman for a traffic violation. I was tempted to talk and pay my way through to save time and any inconvenience. However, all my children's eyes were on me and listening intently to what the policeman was saying. Without any further discussion, I turned in my driver's licence and asked the policeman to issue me a traffic violation ticket.

Little things like queueing or waiting for your turn, being considerate with house help, having vices like smoking and ingesting alcoholic drinks, caring for pets and treating your employees – all leave an imprint in their memories.

Sometimes, when I lose my temper and raise my voice in anger, they cower in fear but afterwards, they would ask me why I acted that way. I would explain carefully what instigated the violent reaction and admit that it could have been handled more calmly. When they commit mistakes, I will point out the error and also show them what is the right thing to do. The key is constant and patient communication.

On the other hand, we also have to teach them to be responsible members of the community. My involvement in the outreach projects of Rotary seems to have rubbed off on them too. On their own, they have been celebrating their birthdays with less fortunate children. On Christmas day, it has become a family tradition to distribute hot "arroz caldo" to the streetchildren. They donate their old clothes to charity. Hopefully they also pass on these values to their children.

Our joy in parenting comes from seeing our children follow the right path. Then we realize that it was worth all the sacrifices and the time we spent showing them good examples. And the cycle goes on from one generation to another.

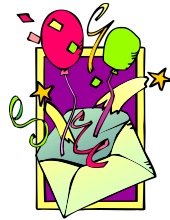

Youth Development in the Vocation of School Management

I recently got elected as President of our school in the province and this has opened up many new challenges and doors of opportunity to serve. The school I now run has about 2,000 students in the main campus and about 500 in our small town campus that is 30 minutes away.

We serve the middle income to low income families and our tuition fees are not geared to earning us great profits. All our students pay tuition in installments and when harvest is poor or their parents get sick or laid off, they are quick to request approvals of promissory notes so that they can continue with their schooling. Many of our students ask for subsidies that oftentimes we are hard pressed to look for matching scholarship donations as we cannot turn them away because they want to learn.

The School Board is also committed to delivering quality education at affordable costs and this entails having to look for teachers who are willing to sacrifice monetary reward in exchange for a heart that is satisfied by the knowledge that he or she is able to help others even if it is only for a part of their teaching career. We are working to get a higher level of accreditation, looking at careers that will enable our students to be gainfully employed or earning on their own and looking at programs to enhance the moral values of our students as well as their consciousness in serving others.

The work is challenging. Day to day problems & concerns are varied. Yet, I know that because it is important to help form our youth so that they become productive & reliable citizens in the near future, I know that I have to think creatively, network, motivate, review, enhance & accept the challenges that come with managing an educational institution, however small it is.

I walk in the presence of many Doctors in Education (I have jokingly said that I am the patient) who inspire me by their dedication. I see parents who want to see their children get an education that will help make them rise above their present circumstances. I meet with students of various levels of interest to excel and they remind me of many of the youth we also meet in Interact and Rotaract or in our families. Yet it is in them that I know the calling to serve above self is resounding. The Rotary Programs I have been involved with and the work experiences I have had, are foundational blessings afforded to me by the Lord so that I can achieve the goals and challenges I now face. I am happy that the High School and College student organizations have also now decided to do tree planting and waste segregation. I am pleased that Student Affairs has also now built into their calendars a program we have aptly named "Give Blood on Christmas." I am pleased that even our dentist and school nurses are excited about doing their share to educate and encourage the young students in our campus and in our adopted barangay on good dental care and hygiene. I pray for their commitment to make these ongoing programs of the institution work.

When I joined Rotary, my official classification was environment work. During the course of my brief stay in the organization, I have been involved in business management of Foundations. Now I am into School Management of an institution that has elementary, high school, college and graduate school levels. I face great challenges yet I know that with a heart of dedicated service molded when I became a Rotarian and a constant seeking of the Lord's guidance through the people He provides, I am sure I will be able to help the youth in our school grow.

Training tips from Rotary Training Talk



- Thanks to a Rotarian in District 3790 (Philippines) for this tip: When conducting a train-the-trainer session, the trainer should strive to model positive feedback to trainees. As a trainer, consider different ways to correct information that is wrong, and encourage openness to everyone's opinions. Remind trainees that people can agree to disagree. Be appreciative of good points, and don't forget to use humor to set the mood of a happy learning environment.
- For innovative brainstorming, try using cards with different images on them. You can print them from your own photo collection or use photos found online or in magazines. Have participants partner with someone to find two cards with opposite images. Have each pair explain why the images on their cards are opposite. Then have the partners think of a third new idea that would combine the different images they selected. For example, if one partner chose a picture of a rock and another chose a picture of a garden, they might think of a rock garden or a sculpture of a rose as a way to bring these seemingly opposite objects together. The cards are a great training tool because they can be used in many ways, and the images elicit memories, emotions, and unique ideas.
- Have any of your participants been too serious for your interactive activities? Here are some tips for making skeptical learners into laughing ones:
 - Acknowledge their concerns.
 - Explain the benefits of interaction, including physical mobility for brain stimulation and emotion for retention.
 - Give them some options, and allow them to suggest additional learning methods before choosing a method together.
